- 2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:
  - Curriculum Development: Ever since the college became autonomous, it has been striving hard to improve its curriculum and syllabi. The college revised all its courses and programmes incorporating the latest developments in the concerned subjects and disciplines. The strategy that the college keeps in mind while developing its curricula and syllabi are: 1) skill development of the students 2) thrust on frontier areas 3) compatibility with national curriculum framework 4) equipping the students for national level competitive examinations 5) developing research aptitude
  - Teaching and Learning: The teaching –learning has been the forte of the college and it is the reason for the high social accreditation of the college. The faculty takes special care to complete the portions on time, prepare the students for their internal and external examinations, provide the students with remedial, bridge and tutorial, encourage students to make use of library and other learning resources, to encourage them to attend extension lectures, arrange invited talks by eminent

persons, provide challenging assignments, make seminar presentations, organise quiz and paper presentation competitions, prepare for paper presentations in national and international seminars and so on

- Examination and Evaluation: The examination and evaluation system of the college is functioning with near perfection. The students are given the examination timetable and the date for the publication of results at the beginning of every academic year. The examination system is established without any loopholes and the controller of examinations ensures the quality of question papers with the help of external scrutinizers. The results are published on time and the grievances if any are redressed immediately.
- Research and Development: Research and development is a major thrust area of the college. The
  college encourages teachers to undertake research projects with funding from governmental and
  non-governmental organisations. The faculty is also encouraged to publish in international and
  national journals, give invited lectures in other prestigious institutes, attend national and
  international conferences and visit other institutes.
- Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: The College has been making steady
  improvement in the development of library, ICT and other infrastructural facilities. It has added
  nearly 5000 books to the library during the last academic year, created 15000 sq. ft. of space in
  terms of class rooms and activity centre and added several computers and software for ICT enabled
  teaching
- Human Resource Management: The college recruited new faculty members in different departments and appointed non-teaching staff on its own to manage the affairs of the college.
- Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The college in constant contact with industries and employment providers and has been able to attract the them for the campus recruitment of students.
- Admission of Students: Ever since the college attained autonomy, the application for admission

The bar coding of answer books by the college is fully implemented. Online multiple choice examinations are conducted for a few courses. Double valuation of answer scripts are implemented for all the PG programmes. Revaluation and Challenge valuation of answer scripts facility are offered. Open forums of Parents, Teachers and Students are conducted after the internal examinations at UG and PG level and

progress of the students are discussed. Development of a question bank for all post graduate programmes has completed and questions are formulated from the pool and scrutiny is done by subject experts.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The student development office organised regular outreach programmes in the community where students can involve in various social service programmes which includes medical camps (medical checkup, life style descries detection) for community, cleaning of public places, beach cleaning, various awareness classes like cancer, mental health, road safety, fitness, eye camp and skill training programme. The college organised a clean drive for one week in association with Suchitwwabodhanayajnjam, an annual cleanliness awareness programme by Mitradham.

The Women's Club SWASTI organises a PAPER BAG MAKING workshop: Taking a step forward to being ecofriendly, paper bag making was taught to the members of swasti by Ms Usha from Fevicryl company.

SWASTI SWASTI in coordination with the Sustainable Menstruation Kerala Collective and Red cycle, conducted an awareness event on promoting sustainable menstruation. Experts in the area gave a talk on the social stigma related to menstruation. The volunteers of the SMKC introduced some ecofriendly, reusable produts to the students. it was followed by an interactive session.

The Tourism club visited Home of Destitutes at Perumanoor on July 6<sup>th</sup> 2017. Students interacted with the members and also conducted cultural activities. A total of 65 students participated in the programme.

The NSS unit organised many activities like donation of blood, planting saplings at KURTC bus stand, cleaning of public places like KSRTC bus stand, south railway station, beautification of campus, book distribution to school students, Fort Kochi beach cleaning, self defense training class, promotion of public transportation, etc. As a part of event SWACHHTA, a central government initiative, the unit organized a class on cleaning and environment protection. The unit arranged various awareness campaigns against antidrug and illicit trafficking, a massive protest against the secret deforestation in the Mangalavanam premise. The NSS unit conducted a seven day major camp 'JAIVAM' with a goal to create 'HarithaSaaksharatha' among the natives of Kottayam district. The NSS served the Okhi disaster area, Chellanam at the perfect moment.

The ENCON club of the college organised Urjakiran, an awareness project funded by Centre for Environment and Development.

In association with Organic Kerala Charitable Trust, the college organised organic fair and seminar on promoting organic farming and farmers.

# **Environment Day-2017**

In connection with world environment day, Bhoomithrasena club organizes a seminar and different intercollegiate competitions (elocution, painting, poster quiz ) based on the focal theme "connecting people to nature". The seminar was inaugurated by Dr. Shijo Joseph ( Scientist E1, KFRI). The seminar was sponsored by KSCSTE.

#### **WORLD OZONE DAY OBSERVATION-2017**

In connection with World Ozone Day celebration, Sacred Heart College, Thevara in collaboration with Kerala State Council for Science, Technology and Environment (KSCSTE) organized various programs which include poster making competition, quiz competition, signature campaign and rally etc. on 25th and 26th of September 2017. Dr Linto Alappat (HOD, Dept. of Geology, Christ College, Irinjalakuda) inaugurated the seminar in the Marian Hall of Sacred Heart College. Dr.Prasant Palackappillil CMI (Principal) presided over the function. Dr. T James (Director, Centre for Environmental Science, SH College, Thevara), Dr.K.B.Jose (Science Dean, SH College) and Prof.Midhun Dominic (Coordinator of seminar, S.H College) were present in the function. The focal theme "Caring for All Life under the Sun" was highlighted for talks and discussions.

#### **ONE DAY TRAINING PROGRAMME**

A one day training program was organized for all Mid- Zone BhoomitraSena Club members and their Faculty in Charge (FIC) at St. Xavier's college, Aluva, on 25th

November 2017. The training was organized by Kerala government with the help of Department of Climate Change. The training was inaugurated by Padma Mehanti, IFS (Director, environment and climate change)

#### **ORGANIC FARMING**

To start organic farming the corridor adjoining the chemistry lab of SH College, Thevara was cleaned by BhoomitraSena Club members on 22nd December 2017. The group led by Sr. Shini (2nd BSc. Zoology) were successful in sowing the seeds to promote organic farming.

#### PAPER BAG MAKING

To highlight the importance of recycling, the BhoomitraSena Club, SH College, Thevara, organized a class on paper bag making at the food chemistry lab on 21st December 2017. The class was taken by Devika (M.A. Economics). The students utilized old newspapers and chart papers to make the bags and the class was successful in achieving its purpose.

# Training in cage fish farming

The BhoomitraSena club members organized an invited talk on cage fish farming on 5th December, 2017 at Melesius Hall, SH College, Thevara. Dr.Imelda Joseph (Scientist, CMFRI) was the resource person. Inspired by the lecture, a visit to cage fish farm at Moothakunnam along with CMFRI officials Mr. Suresh and Mr. Prasad was organized on 16th December 2017. About 40 students were participated in the event.

# 5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

In the beginning of the year, the IQAC organised a 2 day Orientation Programme for the newly admitted students to familiarize them with the college, its activities, infrastructure, learning resources, services offered to students, the various clubs and cells and student support programmes.

At the end of the programme, the final year students were given a career orientation programme to equip them to secure more placement opportunities and higher studies.

Academic calendar and exam schedule were prepared and distributed to the students to disseminate information regarding the internal assessment, End Semester examinations, programme schedule etc.

Remedial coaching, student counselling services, parent teacher meetings, active student mentoring programme are all streamlined and made effective during the academic year. The details of the student service programme are printed and publicised through the college handbook.

A fulltime student counsellor is continuing her service in the field of student counselling.

Every programme intended for student support and progression was made known to the students using the public announcement system and through website of the college

The mentoring programme is strengthened and students are properly monitored.

The grievance redressal mechanism is made more effective by the interface meeting between the student council and the authorities.

An Induction cum awareness programme is organised for the I UG and I PG students in the campus to make them aware of the student support programmes as well as various clubs and fora functioning in the college.

Walk With Scholar (WWS) programme was initiated for outstanding UG students of six selected departments.

Parent teacher meeting is organised once in every semester and PTA executive meeting is convened every month.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

Every year, IQAC meets the faculty of various departments after the university results are published. In this meeting, the results are evaluated and strategies are formulated to improve upon students' performance.

Teacher evaluation and the performance of students are analysed by using statistical tools and records are maintained by IQAC.

Every department conducts an open house where the students along with their parents to discuss the performance of the students after every internal assessment. The fast leaners are given academic counselling while slow learners are provided with remedial classes.

Feedbacks are collected from various stakeholders of the college every year and the responses are collated and evaluated. The relevant suggestions were incorporated in the planning for the upcoming year and the grievances addressed.

The placement of 64 smart students in leading companies could be achieved through the efforts of the placement cell of the college. A good number of students were also placed through off campus interviews.

All the students in the final year UG are motivated to be involved in outreach programmes.

# 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

#### 6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision: Fashioning of an enlightened society founded on a relentless pursuit of excellence, a secular outlook on life, a thirst for moral values as well as unflinching faith in God.

Mission: To provide an environment that facilitates the holistic development of the individual, enables our students to play a vital role in the nation building process and contributes to the progress of humanity, disseminates knowledge even beyond the academia, instils in the students a feel for frontier disciplines and cultivates a concern for the environment by setting lofty standards in the ever evolving – leaner interface

#### 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes. The whole process of admission, beginning from the call for online application to the distribution of final marklist at the end of the course is completely carried out through the MIS. The admission process, rank calculation, details of students finally admitted on the basis of their ranking are all available in the MIS and it can be retrieved later for various purposes. The entry of attendance, results of the internal and End Semester Examinations are effectively managed through the MIS and it can be retrieved by the students and teachers through MIS. The office automation is in progress. The college has shifted to the question bank system in 2017 in the postgraduate programmes to ensure the quality and standard of the question paper. The bank system is completely computerised and is functioning very effectively.

#### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Ever since the college became autonomous, it has been striving hard to improve its curriculum and syllabi. The college revised all its courses and programmes incorporating the latest developments in the concerned subjects and disciplines. The strategy that the college keeps in mind while developing its curricula and syllabi are: 1) skill development of the students 2) thrust on frontier areas 3) compatibility with national curriculum framework 4) equipping the students for national level competitive examinations 5) developing research aptitude.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The teaching —learning has been the forte of the college and it is the reason for the high social accreditation of the college. The faculty takes special care to complete the portions on time, prepare the students for their internal and external examinations, provide the students with remedial, bridge and tutorial, encourage students to make use of library and other learning resources, to encourage them to attend extension lectures, arrange invited talks by eminent persons, provide challenging assignments, make seminar presentations, organise quiz and paper presentation competitions, prepare for paper presentations in national and international seminars and so on

The ICT facilities in the campus are maintained and improved by substituting with new programmes.

Bridge courses are offered by every department to warm up the students from various streams of plus-two into their programmes of their choice.

Orientation talks are arranged by the college and the department to prepare the students to make them aware of the career prospects after the completion of the UG and PG programmes.

Workshops were held for the new students to improve competency in English.

Tutorial and remedial classes are conducted regularly to prepare the students for their study.

Various departments of the college organised 19 Academic seminars to update the students of the recent developments in every subject.

Special classes are conducted to compensate the lost working days and to complete the instruction hours of the syllabus in time.

Compulsory seminars, assignments and open courses are offered for the students to overcome the tediousness of the conventional method.

Academic calendar with details of internal assessment and holidays are given in the College Handbook circulated at the beginning of the academic year.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Periodical class tests, two internal tests and an end semester examination for each course in a programme are conducted. Seminar presentation by students and assignments and viva-voce are conducted to assess performance of the students. Surprise test are conducted by some teachers to track the student progression. The evaluation of the answer sheet are conducted in a centralised camp under the supervision of the head of the department to minimize the errors during the evaluation. The results are published and the students are given chances to redress the grievances regarding the evaluation.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Research and development is a major thrust area of the college. The college encourages teachers to undertake research projects with funding from governmental and non-governmental organisations. The faculty is also encouraged to publish in international and national journals, give invited lectures in other prestigious institutes, attend national and international conferences and visit other institutes.

The faculty of the college had 21 International and 4 National research publications to their credit. In the present year 3 Major projects are going on in various departments.

In addition to the projects fund, the management allotted 2 lakhs for supporting any socially relevant research projects (Sacred Heart Advanced Research Endeavour).

# 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The College has been making steady improvement in the development of library, ICT and other infrastructural facilities. It has added nearly 5000 books to the library during the last academic year, created 15000 sq. ft. of space in terms of class rooms and activity centre and added several computers and software for ICT enabled teaching.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college recruited new faculty members in different departments and appointed non-teaching staff on its own to manage the affairs of the college. The college has a self-appraisal system to evaluate the performance of the faculty. Feedbacks is collected from the students at the end of a semester. Corrective measures are taken based on the assessment. The vacant faculty posts were filled. Guest faculty were appointed in the beginning of the academic year. Newly appointed faculty were sent for orientation and refresher courses. Apart from the office staff in the aided stream, many administrative staff and personnel were appointed by the management for the smooth functioning of the college.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Faculty and non teaching staff selection is done on the basis of merit adhering to the norms of the UGC and Govt. of Kerala.

#### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college in constant contact with industries and employment providers and has been able to attract the them for the campus recruitment of students. The final year students visit factories and industries. PG courses like MSc Aquaculture and MA Multimedia also have industrial visit and

training. BA English copy editor has an on the job training during the vacation after the 4<sup>th</sup> semester. Experts from industry are incorporated into various academic and advisory bodies

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

Ever since the college attained autonomy, the application for admission has increased tremendously. In most of the courses the sanctioned seat and application ratio is 1: 20. The University rules are strictly followed. The college admits students for UG and PG programmes as per Government norms as the college was declared autonomous.

# 8. Future Plans of action for next academic year (500 words)

The IQAC will have a hectic schedule during the academic year 2018-2019 as it prepares for NAAC accreditation during the academic year 2019-2020. The IQAC will organize an OBE workshop for the faculty as it is necessary for the college to move towards an outcome based education. The teachers will have to be trained in Blooms taxonomy to prepare the course plan which forms the backbone of academic transaction. The IQAC also plans to organize several rounds of Moodle training to develop a learning management system. The IQAC also plans to organize an IPR seminar for the faculty and postgraduate students to make them aware of intellectual property rights, patents, geographical indexing and related matters. The IQAC will sensitize the students about the possibilities of getting additional knowledge through NPTEL and MOOCH courses. The IOAC also will have to systematically document the details relating to academic and non-academic activities of the college for the fourth cycle of NAAC accreditation. The IQAC will initiate steps to revise the syllabi of postgraduate courses and the modifications of the syllabi of the undergraduate courses. The revised syllabi of certain programmes in the college will be implemented during the coming academic year. The internal evaluation mark and attendance entry system will be improved and enhanced in the coming academic session. The IQAC will advise the college council and the controller of examinations to publish the results, if possible within 30 days after the examinations. The IQAC also will advise the departments and faculty members to undertake more research projects. The faculty will be encouraged to publish their research articles in journals which are Scopus indexed having higher impact factor. The IQAC will encourage the science departments to apply for FIST project of DST as well as the STAR programme of DST. The IQAC would advise the department of English to apply for a Research Centre as the department has qualified faculty to serve as research guides. All the qualified faculty members will be encouraged to become research guides and accept research students for carrying out research leading to the award of Ph D degree. The IQAC will encourage the college to sign an MoU with MHRD (EDCIL) for accepting international students in its various courses. The IQAC will initiate the process of applying for RUSA funding of the MHRD and undertake infrastructural developments in the college. The IQAC will also advise the management to construct an underground rainwater harvesting unit under the RUSA project. Moreover, it would also recommend to the management to develop additional space for class rooms, toilets, recreation and other activities.
