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

MAPPING SCIENTIFIC DISCOURSE IN FICTION

More than any other epistemological feature it is the variety and ubiquity of scientific discourse that marks the present historical moment. Since its earliest provenance as a coherent praxis, science has achieved exponential growth, by "an estimated five orders of magnitude in three centuries" (Merton and Garfield, "Foreword"). Its products, institutions and laws have come to influence almost all life on the planet. The pervasiveness of scientific and technological interventions ordering contemporary lived experience may be read as signalling a paradigm shift to an increasingly post human future.

All texts too are inscribed with accounts of scientific artefacts, controversies or scientists. The elements of science that pervade texts are more often than not ignored by literary critical analyses. They are mostly relegated in favour of reflexive analyses which are concerned with the structural, semiotic or stylistic features of the text itself. The numerous scientific objects, references, and disciplines scattered throughout the text are mostly treated as window dressing. Even in the eponymous genre of sf (science fiction), contemporary criticism is content to relegate study of the textual science in favour of stylistic and structural elements. This seminar investigates the intersections between literature and science, and probes the methodologies and tools that may be deployed in opening up 'Science' to critical scrutiny. By scrutinizing science as what Donna Haraway terms "situated knowledges" where "object of knowledge is pictured an actor and agent, not as a screen or a ground or a resource, [and] never finally as slave to the master that closes off the dialectic in his unique agency and his authorship of "objective" knowledge", the seminar seeks to map the hitherto inchoate terrain between the humanities and the sciences.

Subhi Treasa Sebastian (1981-2016) had been a member of the faculty of English, S H College, Theyara from 2010 to 2016. The name, 'Subhi', has almost become a metaphor of unruffled calm and unalloyed commitment for all who had the good fortune to know her.
