





The course seeks to provide the student with knowledge of the growth of English language and literature up to the age of Chaucer. It also introduces the student to the social cultural and intellectual background of the late Medieval period in English Literature and to sensitize him/her to the major literary works of the period. The socio-cultural situations during the centuries preceding Chaucer should provide a solid footing for the study of Chaucer and the English literature that came after him. The evolution of English from Old English to Middle English must gain focus here. The development of English into the language used by Chaucer and his contemporaries—both the literary men and the general public—from Indo-European has to be discussed with special emphasis on the Germanic sub-family to which English belongs. How Celtic Britain changed into Anglo-Saxon and later Norman England and how the English triumphed over the French by the time of Chaucer form the backdrop to this course. In other words, the history of England has to be seen as a history of power

struggles. The Celts who were suppressed by the Anglo Saxons, resurface in the Arthurian legends, Scottish and Irish literatures and in the Irish literary






